Did you know that each municipality in Saskatchewan shall adopt a Code of Ethics Bylaw (pursuant to subsection 93.1 of *The Municipalities Act*)?

This Bylaw ensures that "as members of council, we recognize that our actions have an impact on the lives of all residents and property owners in the community. Fulfilling our obligations and discharging our duties responsibly requires a commitment to the highest ethical standards." And, "The quality of the public administration and governance of the Town of Hanley, as well as its reputation and integrity, depends on our conduct as elected officials". This bylaw echoes the Oath or Affirmation of Member of Council that must be signed after they are elected.

The Town of Hanley Council adopted a bylaw in 2016 to fulfill these requirements.

### Hanley Housing Program

The Hanley Housing Authority on behalf of Saskatchewan Housing Corporation, offers the Social Housing Program. This program is designed to ensure that safe, adequate housing is available to those who could not otherwise afford it. Our tenants benefit from a safe place to call home, a community they can enjoy and peace of mind.

### **General Requirements for Housing**

Applicants must meet income and asset limit requirements to be eligible for the Housing Program. All applicants are required to complete an application form and provide verification of income and assets, as requested.

### **Review Process**

Applications are reviewed for eligibility and approved by the Housing Authority Board of Directors. We utilize a point score system that considers adequacy, suitability and affordability when determining the priority of need.

Once approved, units are allocated upon availability on a priority based, point score system.

Additional Information Senior housing rent is based on income -30% of gross household income, collected via pre-authorized payment.

Units are smoke free – No smoking in the units by tenants or guests. Housing tenants are responsible for obtaining and paying for their own power. Heat, water/sewer are included in the rent.

Any questions related to the Hanley Housing Authority should first be directed to the manager.

All requested income information and previous landlord references must be included or application will not be processed.

#### TRANSFER STATION INFORMATION NOTICE OF ITEMS ACCEPTED AT THE TOWN OF HANLEY TRANSFER STATION

In accordance with our permit and Loraas Disposal the following items will <u>NOT</u> be accepted at the transfer station:

1. Tires;

2. Hazardous wastes of any kind: pesticides, chemicals which are radioactive, reactive, toxic, ignitable, corrosive, pathological, acidic, etc., or any waste which is otherwise listed as a hazardous or toxic substance;

3. Petroleum, petroleum remains or by-products;

4. Fuel tanks or oil barrels;

5. Asbestos, concrete, rocks, wire;

- 6. Petroleum contaminated soils;
- 7. Automobiles and other large metal objects;
- 8. Remains of or by-products of slaughter house operations;
- 9. Liquid domestic sewage, used oil, liquid wastes and sludges generally;
- 10. Liquid paints and solvents (dried material and empty cans are OK in the Loraas bin);
- 11. Acid-filled automotive batteries;
- 12. Propane tanks;
- 13. Any wood products treated with creosote (telephone poles, wooden pilings, railroad ties, etc.)

There are designated areas for steel. ONLY TREES OR UNTREATED/UNPAINTED LUMBER MAY GO IN THE BURNING PIT. Contact the Town Office regarding bin rental.

### NOTES FROM THE TOWN OFFICE

### At our June Meeting:

Gerrid Gust, Sask Party nominee for Arm River Constituency attended the meeting to introduce himself to Council and listen to concerns they may have.

The culvert crossing Railway St. at 2<sup>nd</sup> Ave. was budgeted to have extensions on either end. This was reviewed and the culvert will be replaced.

A sewer service invoice was presented to Council for payment but the Council referred to the "Water and Sewer Management Bylaw" whereby a sewer service is the responsibility of the owner of the property from the building to the main and the invoice was returned to the owner.

The Baptist Church community wanted to do something for the Town so the Council supported them building a deck in the area between Brightwater Insurance and the Library. Thanks to those involved in that project! The area looks much better!

The Administrator reported having attended the WaterWolf AGM June 24 in Outlook; a SUMA Webinar about changes to Municipal Legislation on May 14 (the Mayor was in the office so he listened in also); a PE-BA webinar about changes to reporting for MEPP on May 16; another SUMA webinar on an Introduction to Risk Management on May 29; a Municipal Advisory Services webinar on General Administration; an Asset Management workshop held in the Senior's Centre in Hanley on May 28; and the DRWU AGM on May15, the regular meeting on May 29 and mediation on June 25.

A request by a past resident of the area was reviewed with the decision to present Michelle Geddes with a certificate of Honourary Citizenship of the Town of Hanley at the 2019 Hanley Ag Fair.

Replies were to be made to the President of Agvantage Development Corp in regards to the concerns of the inspection reports that were completed in April of 2019. This decision led the Council to instruct the Administrator to send follow-up letters to all parties of the Industrial Park servicing agreement inspection asking how work is progressing on the deficiencies noted on the inspection reports and trust that the deficiencies will be completed by August 31, 2019. The Council also requested progress reports.

Four Bylaws were adopted which included:

1) Waterworks amendment adding the enforcement costs to the utility billing;

2) Traffic amendment addition Stop & Yield signs at the corners of Bodeman Ave. and 1<sup>st</sup> St.;

3) A new Planning District Agreement with the municipalities that are members of WaterWolf Planning Commission; and,

4) Fire Restriction which better defines who has the authority to declare a Fire Ban.

Two Policies were adopted which included:

1) The Administrator is approved to purchase small advertisements with a limit of \$100 per advertisement; and,

2) The Administrator, at their discretion, is approved to purchase flowers for bereaved staff or Council with a limit of \$100 per bereavement.

The Council followed up with a 2018 Nuisance declaration to notify the owner that the Council would be acting on the declaration by contracting remedial action.

The student that the Council had offered the summer employment to did not accept the offer of employment so an offer is to be made to Kianna Dietz to summer employment. Kianna accepted the offer and you will see her out and about the Town again doing duties as set out by the Foreman.

The Administrator was approved to register for the SUMA Municipal Symposium: The Future of Municipal Development July 28 in Moose Jaw, SK.

### NOTES(cont'd)

### At our July meeting:

A quote was provided to Council following the hydrant inspection completed by EMCO. It was decided to accept the quote to have the repairs done this year.

The Waterworks and Sewage Works annual inspections were completed and results reviewed by Council. A quote was provided by Loraas Disposal for supplying the bins at the Transfer Station. This quote was accepted for 2020.

Council was invited to a meeting at the RM of Dundurn to review the DRWU Corporate Bylaw. Mayor Marv Gerbrandt & CAO Darice Carlson will attend this meeting.

The Administrator reported having attending the WaterWolf AGM on June 24. There were presentations by auditor Jim Twigg; Saskatchewan Community Planning Branch; and Crosby-Hanna, WaterWolf's planners. She also reported having attended a SUMA webinar on how to prosecute bylaws.

Four Bylaws were adopted:

- 1) To provide for entering into a lease agreement with the Curling Club;
- 2) Amending the definition of "Junked Vehicles" in the Nuisance Bylaw;
- 3) Amending the Traffic Bylaw to reflect new street names; and,
- 4) A General Penalty bylaw to replace the outdated one.

Complaints of two nuisance yards was brought to Council's attention. The Administrator is to send letters to owners/residents of the properties to have the grass cut and tidied.

A decision was made in regards to the Artificial Ice Project to instruct the Administrator to draft a bylaw and promissory note for the Council to consider lending the Artificial Ice Committee money to proceed with the project.

The Administrator received approval for holidays for the week of July 15 - 19 with the office to be closed on July 19.

The Administrator notified Council of a Provincial Traffic Safety F $\sqrt{}$ und grant available so they instructed her to apply for the funding to purchase three radar speed signs for speed management.

Bunnyhugs were donated to the Ag Fair and the Family Fun Day at the Golf Course.

The cost of the Loraas waste container will be donated for the Ag Fair again this year.

The Administrator was approved to pay donations to the Hanley Ag Society as they are received.

A fireworks request was approved with a suggestion of the display in the Town's open area/drainage channel behind the Dance Studio.

# TOWN OF HANLEY SWIMMING POOL BYLAW

It's that time of year where there may be a number of swimming pools popping up in the community. The Council for the Town of Hanley wish to remind residents of the "Swimming Pool" bylaw.

Some of the key points of the Bylaw are:

- The definition of a "private swimming pool" is "an artificial pool of water having a depth at any point of 18" or more and/or has a surface area of 100 sq.ft. or more, and is constructed or erected on private property for the principal use of the occupants of the premises, and includes both surface and underground pools." This definition would include hot tubs that have a surface area of 100 sq.ft. or more!
- The owner of every "pool" shall erect and maintain an adequate enclosure surrounding the entire swimming pool area and sufficient to make such body of water not readily accessible to small children.
- Every enclosure shall extend from the ground for a height of not less than 6 ft throughout, and shall be measured from the exterior of same. Openings in any enclosure shall not exceed 4".
- Every enclosure having a gate or gates shall be equipped with self-closing and selflatching devices placed at the top and on the inside of the gate. No gate shall be less than 6' in height, nor of a width exceeding 4'.
- Buildings situated on the property on which the pool is to be constructed or erected may be utilized to effectively enclose any pool.
- Every swimming pool shall be equipped with a reaching pole; a first aid kit and buoys and rope.

This bylaw has continued to stay in force to prevent liability to you and the Town which means, if your pool does not comply with the bylaw and an incident occurs, you AND the Town could be sued.

Please ensure your summer swimming fun does not become an "incident". The bylaw can be viewed or a copy obtained from the Town Office.

# Fireworks - Celebrate Safely!



Many celebrate the season and special events with fireworks, but Emergency Management and Fire Safety asks that you plan for personal safety and potential fire hazards before making a living night sky.

# Here are some important safety tips to be followed:

- Appoint a person to be in charge. Only adults who are aware of the hazards and essential safety precautions should handle and discharge fireworks. Alcohol and fireworks do not mix.
- Carefully read and follow the label directions on fireworks packaging.
- Light only one firework at a time and only when they are on the ground.
- Always keep a water hose or pail of water close by when discharging fireworks.
- Discharge fireworks only if wind conditions do not create a safety hazard.
- Discharge fireworks well away from combustible materials like buildings, trees and dry grass.

- Keep onlookers a safe distance away, upwind from the area where fireworks are discharged.
- Never try to light a firework in your hand or re-light dud fireworks. For dud fireworks, wait 30 minutes and soak them in a bucket of water. Dispose of them in a metal container.
- Keep sparklers away from children. Sparklers burn extremely hot and can ignite clothing, cause blindness and result in severe burns. As the sparkler wire remains hot for some minutes after burnout, it should be immediately soaked in water to avoid injury.
- If someone gets burned, run cool water over the wound for three to five minutes and seek medical attention, if necessary.

If planning a family fireworks or an informal neighborhood display, check with your local fire department and municipality about regulations regarding fireworks. Emergency Management and Fire Safety recommend that it's best to celebrate at public fireworks displays hosted by your municipality or other responsible organization who must adopt public safety standards.

# TOWN TIDBITS:

### Did you know:

The Hanley Town Office is willing to take e-transfers for bill payments but the onus is still on the person making the e-transfer to the Town. To make doubly sure that your payment has been received by the Town, send us a quick email telling us you sent it so we can reply. If you forget to confirm that way, make sure you keep an eye on the accounts that you are making the payment to. For example: if you make a \$100 payment towards your utilities, keep track of the date and check to see that it was applied to your utilities on that date or within a couple days of you e-transferring. The Office may not have time immediately to accept the transfer but we sure try to get it within a couple days.

### Did you know:
