



#### FIRE PROTECTION

The following is the third in a series of notes taken from "Canadian Underwriter.ca" Canada's Insurance and Risk Magazine. We will feature notes in the next few editions of the Hermes.

#### EFFECT ON PUBLIC FIRE PROTECTION

These trends and others result in lower levels of public fire protection and fire prevention. Volunteers are far less likely to join an organization that is poorly equipped and does not provide minimum training or proper PPE.

In many cases, fire insurance grades are getting worse in communities served by volunteer fire departments.

That said, it is not all bad.

When fire insurance grades become worse, property insurance premiums go up. Typically this is the reminder that property owners need to either take additional steps to mitigate the risk (knowing a lower standard of protection exists), or to advocate locally for improvements in public protection.

How can the trend be corrected? The answer is easier than one might think.

Using the Canadian Fire Insurance Grading Index diligently will stop the downward trend in public fire protection. This is why the index was invented. When insurers diligently adjust premiums based on the fire insurance grades, the impact is immediate and financial.

Property owners who experience increased costs for property insurance as a result of poor levels of fire protection can apply pressure to their elected officials to improve policies for higher standards of fire protection. If communities respond by improving protection, this results in improved grades, and better access to lower insurance premiums.

The challenge today is that fire losses are down and other perils are a bigger concern now. Although true, it is important to remember why fire losses are down.

The underlying financial incentives created by the grading index have resulted in communities having the leverage they need to make proactive choices in mitigating fire risks through developing, implementing and enforcing building and fire codes, as well as by providing water supplies and fire departments for responses to fires.

Every month, there are examples of communities contacting FUS for assistance as their public fire protection is nearing the brink of extinction.

In one recent case, a fire hall had just two volunteer firefighters left on the roster, prompting the fire chief to notify FUS as the local council was refusing support. Once council members realized insurers would adjust premiums in the area if the station was no longer recognized, they immediately began a program to revitalize the response capacity.

#### ANIMAL CONTROL

Below is part 7 of a series of notes from "An Enlightened approach to companion animal control for Canadian municipalities":

# Being At Large

Dogs and cats should not be permitted to be at large except in designated areas, to ensure the safety of the public, the animal itself, and other animals. A dog or cat being at large is one that is on property other than the property of the owner and is not on a leash and/or under the control of a person responsible.

Many dog owners seek open areas to let their pets run off leash for exercise and social stimulation with other dogs, both important aspects of responsible dog ownership.

Municipalities may consider establishing a neighborhood committee of pet owners and non-pet owners to address the issue of off-leash areas for dogs. The group, operating by consensus, should work to find the most effective solution for their neighborhood.

One possibility would be to establish areas and times of day where dogs are permitted to be off leash. All other municipal bylaws such as stoop and scoop, licensing and dangerous dogs would apply. These areas should be well sign posted so that non-dog owners are aware that dogs will be running loose. Garbage receptacles should be provided and maintained. A growing number of urban municipalities are realizing that permitting cats to roam free inevitably results in trespassing and damage to private property. Concerns are increasing about the overpopulation of cats, predation on birds or other wildlife, contamination of property and the spread of disease. All these concerns are eliminated when cats are kept indoors or under control by a leash or enclosure.

"Please call the Town Office if you are actively chasing an animal at large, otherwise if you do not and the animal gets picked up, the animal will be sent directly to the SPCA in Saskatoon and it is a hefty fine to get them back. Let's all please be responsible pet owners and keep our animal and human loved ones safe."

## Pick up that poop!



Pets & Vets

Recently, some of our clients have commented on the state of our local off-leash dog park. They are disgusted by the amount of dog poop lying around and are afraid for their pet's health, which they should be. Most of our pet's contagious diseases are spread in their feces and by not cleaning up after your pet, you help spread those diseases – some of which can infect people as well.

Many viruses have evolved to spread through feces. Canine and feline Parvoviruses are the most well-known and very contagious diseases spread through feces. Every year, many pets are infected and die from these viruses. In dogs, it creates a gastrointestinal disease that often requires intravenous fluids and sometimes blood transfusions. Cats infected with Feline Parvoviruses often die quickly without giving any signs other than lethargy. Other viruses such as Canine Distemper Virus can be spread in their feces as well. Ca-

nine Distemper is a growing concern in the veterinary community as this once rare, almost invariably fatal disease is showing up again in outbreaks around the world.

Viruses aren't the only pathogens spread by your pet's feces. There are also many parasites spread in our pet's poop, some of which infect us as well.

Different worms such as roundworms, tapeworms and whipworms are spread in their poop. When people ingest the worm eggs, dog and cat worms can cause various forms of Larval Migrans where the worm larva migrate under a person's skin and to different organs such as the liver, lungs, brain and eyes. Giardia and Toxoplasma are other zoonotic parasites that can cause disease in people also, not just pet's.

The infamous zoonotic bacteria, Salmonella and E. Coli are also spread in our pets poop. These bacteria are especially prevalent when our pets are being fed raw food diets. Always use a hole-free bag to pick up poop and wash your hands as soon as possible to prevent becoming sick.

So be nice to your neighbors and clean up after your pet, even if it is in your backyard as they can be spread during times of water run-off such as spring and during rainstorms.

Carry bags with you on your walks and help keep the area clean by picking up after stray animals as well.

You not only help prevent disease transmission but also help keep your neighborhood or park clean for others.



The cemetery continues to be mowed by the town foreman but we are hoping to get volunteers to do the whipper snipping. We are working on controlling the gophers. The gate needs to be welded and then will be painted. Many of the trees at the back have died. They will be removed in the fall.

For future planning of headstones, please consider purchasing the ones with holders attached to the bases. For existing headstones, please try to place items on the sides or very close in front of the headstones. This may help in avoiding damage to the objects and will greatly ease the work of maintenance.

Many of the full grave covers are deteriorating. For this reason, ease of maintenance and future internments, we would like to work toward removing these covers. If there is a cover on your loved one's grave, please email the town office at <a href="townof-mailey.ca">townof-mailey.ca</a>, telling us whether you give permission to remove it.

Thank you to Jerry Decker, bank courier, who volunteers to do maintenance at the cemetery while he waits in Hanley on weekdays.

# **FIRE PROTECTION**

Grass fires can start quickly, spread rapidly and burn very hot, making them especially dangerous.

If you see a grass fire, report it immediately by dialing 911. That will help local firefighters get to the scene as quickly as possible.

Council implemented a bylaw for adding a 2% penalty to utility arrears. After 90 days past due a penalty of 2% shall be added per month starting July 1st.

# FIRE PITS AS PER THE OPEN OUTDOOR FIRE BYLAW:

- 1) Open cooking fires shall not be set unless the following measures are taken: be limited to a diameter of seventy-five (75) centimeters (29.5 in.) and be contained in a non-combustible receptacle constructed of cement, brick, clay (kiln dried), or sheet metal with a minimum 18 gauge thickness;
- 2) the receptacle must be covered with a heavy gauge metal screen with openings not exceeding 13 millimeters (0.5 in.);
- 3) the receptacle must be located on private property, a distance of at least 3.1 meters (10 feet) from any property line, building or other combustible structure;
- 4) the receptacle must be separated from grass and any other vegetation by a distance of at least forty (40) centimeters (15.7 in.) by means of clean earth, sand, gravel or other non-combustible material.

#### **EMERGENCY PREPARDNESS**

- Every person requires 2 liters of water per day.
- Water cannot be purified with soap. Boil water for 10 minutes or disinfect with unscented bleach. Add 3-4 drops of bleach per liter of water with an eyedropper. Mix well and let stand for 30 minutes. The water should smell faintly of chlorine. If it does not, repeat the steps and leave for another 30 minutes.
- Roughly 5,000 earthquakes are recorded in Canada every year.
- In June, most hail storms occur in southern Canada and in the north central United States. Violent storms may deposit enough hail to completely cover the ground, damage crops or block storm sewers. Up to 2% of the value of crops is destroyed by hail every year.

- Tornadoes occur most often in the spring and during the summer, but they may form any time of the year.

#### NOTES FROM THE TOWN OFFICE

# At the April Council Meeting:

A couple fellows from Super Save Group attended the meeting to discuss a possible proposal for solid waste removal. They will supply a proposal at a later date.

The Council decided to purchase a jacket for Fire Chief Darren Grindheim to acknowledge the work he has been doing fundraising for the new Fire Hall Building. Site plan options were reviewed for the new building and one was chosen. The area has been flagged so you can see approximately where it will be situated and an architect and structural engineer have been contracted to draw up plans for the building. As soon as they are available, we can put them on display.

A first reading of a Zoning Bylaw amendment was read which will change the zoning for Canada Ct.

An agreement to purchase land at the eastern end of Second Ave, which was sold to a company that was going to build an apartment, was reviewed. The agreement has expired so unless the company was able to provide more information, the lot would be turned back to the Town.

Ed Applin was contracted as Bylaw Enforcement Officer for animal control. He has been very diligent in reminding people to purchase their animal licenses and issuing fines for animal bylaw contraventions.

Nuisance yards were reviewed again with encouragement sent to people that have not kept their yards in condition.

Advertisements were made for applications to be received for summer student employment.

The 2014 Financial Statements were approved. These will be posted on the Town's webpage.

Wayne Kraft was hired as the new Transfer Station Operator. Wayne has been doing a great job of his duties ensuring that waste is placed in the correct places at the Transfer Station. As you can see in another portion of the newsletter, the Town has to abide by a Permit mandated by the Ministry of Environment. This permit can be inspected at the Town Office.

A letter was to be drafted and forwarded to vendors to the effect that unless approval is provided by the Council through the CAO for work done within the Town, payment will not be made.

Some budget items were reviewed and it was decided to charge an additional \$50 for the rental of 6 yard construction containers to reflect the administration and delivery/removal of these containers. Council also instructed the CAO to draft a bylaw to add a 2% penalty to any utility arrears which would commence July 1, 2015.

#### At our May meeting:

Brian Sawatzky and Sean Gatin of Agvantage Development Corp attended the meeting to give an update on the development west of the rail tracks.

Fire Dept. water charges were reviewed. To date, the Town hadn't been charging for water used for fire calls. In the future, the Fire Dept. is to make note of the volume of water used to fill the tanker trucks and this amount shall be invoiced to the Hanley/Rosedale Fire Protection District at the rate of water charges.

A couple concerns were brought to Council in regards to the Open Outdoor Fire and the Purchase Agreement Bylaws. It was reported that the Fire Chief had dealt with the Open Outdoor Fire occurrence. The CAO was instructed to forward letters of reminder in regards to both bylaws.

The Bylaw adding a penalty to water/sewer/waste arrears was adopted to the effect that a 2% penalty will be added to arrears after 90 days but that invoices were still due and payable 30 days after the date of billing.

A Bylaw to provide for weight restriction to 8T on Railway St (the old highway) was adopted.

The deadline for summer student applications was extended to May 25.

Another nuisance situation was dealt with by letter for a dilapidated building.

A Community Event Permit was approved for the Ag Society for the Ag Fair on June 19 and 20. This is a great community event recognized by the Council for the Town.

A building permit extension was granted.


Beagle Productions Ltd. was contracted for website updates and management. The Town had been fortunate to have Dale Bagnall create and manage the Town's webpage for a number of years. Also, thanks for your years of publishing the Hanley Hermes. Thanks Dale!

The Hanley Hermes will now be published by Office Clerk, Marie Sira, starting with this issue.

Administrator holidays were approved.

Office Clerk, Marie Sira is now eligible to receive group benefits through the Saskatchewan Urban Municipalities Association (SUMA).

The 2015 budget was adopted and bylaws passed reflecting an increase of 3% of the mill rate, minimum taxes and uniform mill rate. In order to provide the basic services for the municipality, this small increase was necessary. See "2015 Town of Hanley Operating Budget".



Items in the operating budget that are required to provide the level of service the Town is receiving now include: gravel (the budget was increased from \$10,000 to \$15,000); street sweeper and other rentals, grass cutting, grading and snow removal; street lights (\$12,000); equipment repairs; oil & gas; drainage clearing/culverts; Police protective services; transfer station operations; animal control; planning & development memberships and advertising; Library requisition and expenses; annual audit; WCB levy; assessment; office rental/caretaking; general insurance; SUMA, UMAAS & web page memberships; office software maintenance; interact and bank fees; office supplies and copier; and of course salaries and Council indemnity to keep everything functioning. These services, along with many other smaller expensed services, are day-to-day expenses.

Extra expenses that Council would like to provide this year are dust control (\$15,000); a bigger sidewalk project (\$19,700); a transfer station building (\$4,000); a check valve on 4<sup>th</sup> St. (\$4,000) and laptops for the office and possibly water plant (\$2,200). Total budgeted expenses for the year are \$648,742.

Revenues for these expenses come from taxes (\$223,051); SaskPower surcharge (\$22,000); Revenue Sharing Grant (\$119,005); Gas Tax Funding (\$29,500) and fees for service. Total budgeted revenue for the year is \$651,943

The water and sewer portion of the budget, not included in the chart, must be self-sustaining with expenses of \$394,209 and revenues of \$399,066.

The budget can be viewed in its entirety at the Town Office.





# Blair's Family of Companies Hanley Project Update

On July 7, 2014, Blair's Family of Companies in conjunction with Agvantage Development Corporation announced that Blair's would be building a fertilizer distribution site within the Hanley Industrial Logistics Park. Since that announcement, significant time and effort has gone into finalizing engineering and designs for the project, obtaining required permits and starting groundwork construction. We are pleased to contribute this article to the *Hanley Hermes* to update the Hanley community on the status of our project. Here are some frequently asked questions and answers we get about our project at Hanley that we would like to share with you.

<u>What Exactly is Blair's Building At Hanley?</u> Our current plan is to construct a fertilizer distribution centre that would receive fertilizer products into this facility by truck and rail. These products would be stored in concrete monolithic domes similar to the one we have built at our Blair's Liberty location. The product once stored would then be trucked to Blair's ag retails and other ag retails as required.

Why Did Blair's Choose to Build This Facility at Hanley, Saskatchewan? The community of Hanley has many things going for it: (a) Hanley is located on a major primary, double lane highway, (b) it is within close proximity to Saskatoon which is beneficial for trade and commerce, (c) there is a railway mainline located near the town, (d) Agvantage Development Corp., has been excellent for us to work with and we are excited to be a part of a logistics park that may create other benefits for our business and, (e) the people of Hanley in both the town and rural municipality have been very welcoming to us and excited about the economic development our project will add to the Hanley and area communities.

<u>Can Farmers Pick Up Fertilizer at this Facility?</u> Our current plan is to operate this facility as a distribution centre. Blair's has 7 ag retail locations in Saskatchewan, the closest ones to Hanley being Strongfield - 25 minutes to the south, Watrous to the east and Liberty to the southeast. At any of these locations, farmers can purchase and pick up fertilizer products.

<u>When Will Additional Construction Begin on This Project?</u> The community of Hanley will soon see signs erected that say...."The Future Home of TexCana Logistics, a division of Blair's Family of Companies". TexCana Logistics is the name of Blair's transportation and logistics division of our company. We expect construction to start up again for this facility in the next two weeks. We hope that this facility will be in full operation sometime between the spring - summer of 2016, however, there is a lot of road, rail and building construction to complete, so it will depend on construction timelines.

How Many People Do You Expect to Employ at This Facility? We will require warehouse and distribution people to work at this facility, a facility manager, and perhaps an administration position as well. We anticipate the project once operational will employ 4-6 people on a full time basis. We will likely be interviewing candidates for employment sometime in the next 12-18 months. The employment plan will be highly dependent on the construction timeline.
