FIRE PROTECTION

FIRE EXTINGUISHERS

READ THE INSTRUCTIONS ON YOUR EXTINGUISHER FOR PROPER USE.

Create a picture in your mind that will reflect the instructions on the extinguisher: if there's a fire, get everyone outside and ask a member of your family to call the fire department from a neighbour's house. Only then should you permit yourself to fight a small fire. If the fire becomes large, get out. Close doors behind you to slow the spread of the fire.

THE ABCD'S OF PORTABLE FIRE EXTINGUISHERS:

A fire extinguisher is a storage container for an agent like water or chemicals. It is designed to put out a small fire, not a large one. Extinguishers are labelled ABC or D. Ensure you use the right extinguisher for the appropriate type of fire.

Ordinary Combustibles - Fires started with paper, wood, drapes and upholstery require a Class A type extinguisher.

Flammable and Combustible Liquids - Fires originating from fuel oil, gasoline, paint, grease in a frying pan, solvents and other flammable liquids require a Class B type extinguisher.

Electrical Equipment - Fires started with wiring, overheated fuse boxes, conductors, and other electrical sources require a Class C type extinguisher.

Metals – Certain metals such as magnesium and sodium require a special dry powder Class D type extinguisher.

A multi-purpose dry chemical labelled ABC puts out most types of fires: wood, paper, cloth, flammable liquids and electrical fires. If you intend to buy more than one, you may want to purchase a BC for the kitchen, an A for the living room and an ABC for the basement and garage.

ANIMAL CONTROL

Below is part 12 of a series of notes from "An Enlightened approach to companion animal control for Canadian municipalities":

OTHER ANIMALS AS PETS

Some people select other animals as pets. These animals have specific needs (behavioural, environmental, social and nutritional) that must be met. Responsible pet ownership practices are no less important. All the following criteria should be taken into account when considering other animals as pets:

- Species ownership is supported by the existence of published information pertinent to its proper animal husbandry and veterinary care requirements
- Species ownership does not pose a significant threat to public health and safety
- The species in question does not represent a significant threat to native (indigenous) wildlife populations
- Species ownership is permitted under provincial, federal or international laws and regulations, such as the following:

Convention on the International Trade in Endangered Species of Wild Fauna and Flora (CITES). Canada is a signatory party.

Wild Animal and Plant Protection and Regulation of International and Interprovincial Trade Act (WAPPRIITA). Federal statute administered by Environment Canada (Canadian Wildlife Service)

At the provincial level, pertinent regulations usually fall under the Ministry of Agriculture and/or Ministry of Natural Resources (Fish and Game Department)

NOTE: Information on all these regulations can be obtained from the local provincial conservation officer or game warden.

The Annual General Meeting for the Community Centre was held Apr. 12 in the Clubroom. The 2015 financial statements were reviewed and adopted.

Gordon McGregor reported on maintenance that had been completed over the last year. There was a poor turn-out for the clean-up day so there wasn't as much accomplished as the committee would have liked. Painting was done in the washrooms and the Health Room had crack filling and the replacement of a ceiling tile. That room will be painted as time allows for volunteers. Caution tape was placed in the hallway in the area that has a bumpy slope. The fan in the ladies washroom was replaced and the ones in the Health Room and men's washroom will be replaced. The hardware on the new main door was fixed and was working better for the time being.

It was decided to purchase Exit decals for the clubroom rather than security lights.

Marie Sira offered to fill the treasurer position so Marlene Simonsen could retire from that position. Thanks Marlene for the many years you served on the board!

The Club 52 lottery was reviewed to discover that due to the low purchase of lottery tickets and the amount of time spent on this lottery that the committee decided to not renew the lottery for the next year. Thank you Cindy Hoffman for your administration of this lottery and the many volunteers that phoned people and collected moneys!

There was a suggestion brought forth from outside this meeting to purchase an automatic door opener for the main door. The suggestion was rejected at this meeting.

A request was to be put forth to the 2017 Culture Club to do some housecleaning in the kitchen and the Secretary was to contact Leanne Leuschen to inquire. After speaking to Leanne, it was decided that the Culture Club would clean both the kitchen and the bar area.

DID YOU KNOW?

June, named after Juno, the goddess of marriage, is the sixth month of the year, and is one of the four months with a length of 30 days. Just like the month of May, no other month begins on the same day as June. This is also the month with the longest daylight hours of the year.

June's birthstones are the Alexandrite, the Moonstone, and the Pearl. Alexandrite represents health and longevity. Moonstones represents change, new beginnings and the shifting tides of emotion and can help a wearer to alleviate stress, especially due to sudden changes in life.

Moonstone is also believed to increase intuition and aid in lucid dreaming. Pearls symbolize purity of heart and faith, as well as growth and transformation through difficult circumstances.

Its birth flowers are the honeysuckle and the rose. Honeysuckle traditionally stands for bonds of devotion, love, fidelity and generosity. Few flowers have as many meanings attributed to them as the rose.

Depending on the type of rose, roses can indicate romantic love, secrecy, desire, gratitude, mourning, impossible hopes, modesty, joy, love at first sight, innocence, sacrifice and much more. In the traditional language of flowers, roses are among the most important flowers.

Notes from the Town Office

At the April meeting of Council:

Correspondence was received from the RM of Rosedale in regards to the Clearing the Path designated roads funding and a request for clarity was returned.

No representations or submissions were received in regards to Bylaws No. 5/16 and 6/16 and they were adopted to amend the Zoning and Official Community Plan maps. A Bylaw to reduce the speed to 60 km/hr on the Town's portion of the 764 Grid for vehicles over 35T was also adopted. We should be seeing even more heavy vehicles going down that road as construction continues in the Industrial Park.

Advertising for a summer student is to take place over the next month with applications received till June 10.

Community Event Permits were issued to the Artificial Ice Committee for a street hockey tournament and social being held on June 4; and to the Ag Society for the Ag Fair being held the weekend of June 17 & 18.

The Policy for waterworks installations was amended to define the type of hydrants that will be allowed on new development.

2015 Utility reserves were transferred to a reserve account. These funds will assist in planning for major water main replacements.

A Certificate of Completion request was reviewed and denied at this time for Bond and Wall Streets and Duncan Road till such time as provisions of the servicing agreement are met.

Mayor Marv Gerbrandt declared the week of May 1 to 7, 2016 as Emergency Preparedness Week. To commemorate this, on suggestion of the Emergency Measures Coordinator Cindy Hoffman, the Council purchased a basic emergency kit to be drawn for on May 6 in a lottery which would consist of one names from each household within the community.

Building Permit charges were reviewed and a bylaw amending the current charge was adopted. In order to assess the new buildings, the Saskatchewan Assessment Management Agency does a maintenance review in the fall of properties that have seen improvement through the building permits. They charge \$20 per inspection so the building bylaw fees needed to reflect the amount of this charge plus an administrative charge to offset the time taken for review; approval and submission of the permit; and collection and payment of fees.

A bylaw to amend the Official Community Plan whereas the development permit fees would be removed from the OCP and set up as a separate bylaw was introduced.

The Administrator was instructed to prepare and Infrastructure Investment Plan and submit it to the Gas Tax Fund for the lagoon dredging project.

A junked vehicle was declared a nuisance and order to remedy is to be sent by registered mail to the owner of the property. The 2016 budget was adopted.

At the May meeting:

A representative from Emterra attended the meeting to discuss options for solid waste removal.

The proposal from Roy & Sons was approved for the dredging of the lagoon.

No representations or submissions were received in regards to Bylaw No. 9/16 so the bylaw to remove the development permit fees from the OCP and create a separate bylaw was adopted.

A number of applications were received for the summer student job. While all the applicants were deemed to be acceptable for the position Jill Kroeger will be offered the position.

A nuisance property that has not been remedied was reviewed. The Administrator was instructed to request a structural engineer to examine a building that the nuisance is attached to after speaking to the owner of the property. The junked vehicle order from April's meeting was noted as remedied.

Authority was provided to Jason Heo to discharge a pellet gun on his property as pest control.

Approval was given for the Public Works Foreman and CAO to attend a water meter replacement program seminar in Saskatoon on June 14.

Notes from the Town Office continued...

A request was received by Council to allow camping on private property. The Council decided that two campers could be allowed but the Zoning Bylaw does not permit this type of request.

Utility arrears over 90 days were reviewed and the CAO instructed to disconnect services to users on Monday, May 16 if payment arrangements are not made by Friday, May 13.

2016 BUDGET FOR THE TOWN OF HANLEY

Notable entries for the 2016 budget for the Town of Hanley are as follows:

Capital projects:

The plan for sidewalk replacements are ongoing with another \$15,000 budgeted. Areas on Lincoln St. have been completed. \$6,000 of the Gas Tax Fund will be allocated to this project.

A new handheld unit for the electronic meter readings was budgeted for as the current one is outdated and no longer supported by Neptune. A new reader will not be purchased unless necessary. \$10,000 is allocated for this purchase if required.

Larger repair and Maintenance projects (Asset Management).

Lagoon dredging will be completed with a budgeted amount of \$45,000. This must be done as the sludge build-up is restricting the new sewage release. The material is over-top of the inlet pipe and is creating a back pressure on the system. This was last done in 2000. Gas tax funding is applied for in the amount of \$23.111 which reflects the remainder of this fiscal year allocation.

The south end of First St. will see some construction this year installing a culvert to improve drainage and build up the street itself. The RM of Rosedale is also building up the southernmost end of their road so this project will flow with theirs. The Town will also be contracting to have the shoulders pulled up on the Town's portion of the 764 Grid. You will also see skim coating and crack-filling on Lincoln St has been completed. \$17,000 was allocated for these projects.

Dust control will be applied again as it was a successful test in 2015. Most of the same streets will have lignosulphonate applied but Grant St. will be added and First St. removed. As the generator seems to be working as it should for the water plant, the feasibility of wiring in the Town shop will be investigated and completed if possible. In the event of a power outage especially during the winter, it is important that the Foreman can have equipment functional. An amount of \$25,500 has been budgeted for these projects.


Repairs are needed for the mower and grader so \$26,000 has been budgeted for equipment repair, parts and tools. The gravel budget has been doubled in 2016 to accommodate extra gravel required for the First St and 764 projects (\$30,000).

A radar speed sign has been ordered so \$6,700 was budgeted to cover that and other signage that may be required. \$5,000 will be awarded to the Artificial Ice committee in the form of a grant.

The water plant has been needing siding for a number of years so \$5,000 has been budgeted.

Major repairs to the lift station were reviewed but looking to the future, if the Town sees further development in Bodeman Court, a new lift station may be required so major repairs were not budgeted for.

All of the above plus day-to-day expenses will be accomplished without increasing the mill rate for 2016. The complete budget may be viewed at the Town Office during regular office hours.






