

FIRE PROTECTION

COOKING PRECAUTIONS

Kitchen fires due to cooking oil or grease igniting into flames cause the fastest-spreading and most destructive type of residential fire. When cooking with grease or oil, it is extremely important that you plan ahead so that you will know how to react fast to fire. Here are some tips:

DEEP FRYING—The safest way to deep fry foods such as chicken or fries is to use a thermostatically-controlled electric skillet or a deep fat fryer.

PAN FRYING—Keep a pan lid or cookie sheet handy in case grease or oil catches fire. The lid or cookie sheet should be slid over the top of the pan to smother the fire. Never attempt to move a flaming pot or pan away from the stove. The movement can fan the flames and so spread the fire. The pan will also likely be very hot, causing you to drop it. In either case, you are placing yourself at great risk. Your immediate action should be to smother the fire by sliding a lid or flat cookie sheet over the pan. Afterwards, turn off the heat and exhaust the fan, allowing the pan time to cool. Most importantly, react fast, because grease fires spread very quickly.

OVEN COOKING—Keep your oven clean. Grease and food splatters can ignite at high temperatures. Ensure that you wear oven mitts when removing cooking containers to avoid serious burns. Follow the cooking instructions for the recipe and the product you are using. Broiling is a popular method of cooking. When you use your broiler, place the rack 5 to 8 cm (two to three inches) from the broiler element. Always place a drip pan beneath the broiler rack to catch the fat drippings. Never use aluminium foil for this purpose because the fat accumulated on the foil could catch fire or spill over.

MICROWAVE COOKING—Microwave ovens are a marvellous time-saving tool, but there are three characteristics of microwave cooking you should be cognisant of: Foods, like those in high-fat or sugar, can heat very rapidly but feel cool to the touch. Pastry fillings can be very hot, but the crust cooler. Milk in baby bottles could be boiling, but the bottle itself not very hot to the touch. Use caution at all times. The heat is reflected by the metal interior. Heat can pass through glass, plastic and other materials. Heat is absorbed by the food.

Do not use tin foil or any other metal objects in the microwave. If a fire occurs, keep the door closed and unplug the unit. Call a qualified maintenance technician to ensure the microwave is in proper working order before using it again.

ANIMAL CONTROL

Below is part 11 of a series of notes from "An Enlightened approach to companion animal control for Canadian municipalities":

Licensing

Municipalities may wish to implement a dangerous dog license that the owner of such a dog must purchase for a significantly higher fee than a regular dog license. Such a license would also have rigid requirements for housing and care of the dog as stated in this section.

Confinement

Dangerous dogs should be kept indoors or in a secured yard that prevents the dog from escaping over or under the fence or by any other means, and that prevents access by the public. They should not be confined only by a chain or tether.

Other Requirements

Warning signs should be clearly and visibly posted on the property where a dangerous dog is kept. Municipalities may also require that owners of dangerous dogs carry additional liability insurance that would cover any damage or harm caused by the dog.

Violations

Dog owners whose animals violate the requirements of the dangerous dog bylaw should receive harsh fines due to the threat of public safety. Fines should be increased for repeat offences. Euthanasia may be imposed, based on the severity and frequency of the infractions.

Dog Fighting

Under no circumstances can dog fighting or the training or keeping of dogs for fighting be permitted. This is an inhumane and illegal activity.

Unsanitary Conditions

For the sake of public health, comfort or enjoyment of any people, and for the animals' well-being, no animal should be kept in unsanitary conditions. This would include an accumulation of feces, an odor, insect or rodent infestation.


Spring!







Did you know?

- The fall and spring equinoxes are the only two times during the year when the sun rises due east and sets due west.
- The first day of spring, the vernal equinox, has 12 hours of daylight and 12 hours of darkness.
- The early Egyptians built the Great Sphinx so that it points directly toward the rising sun on the spring equinox.
- The term "spring fever" refers to a both psychological and physiological symptoms associated with the arrival of spring, including restlessness, daydreaming, and increased sexual appetite. While the exact cause is unclear, scientists believe that increased light, more exercise, and more bare skin influence hormone levels.
- Honeybees are more likely to swarm during the spring. They swarm as a way to start new colonies from successful ones. Surprisingly, swarming honeybees are very docile and the most friendly they will ever be all year.
- Sense of smell can be more acute in spring as there is usually more moisture in the air.
- Spring is often associated with the start of the pollen season. In actual fact some pollen types can release as early as January.



Notes from the Town

At our February Meeting:

It was decided that, rather than looking at the purchase of a new mower, the Foreman has the mower deck repaired.

The Council is requesting quotations for a lagoon assessment from Roy & Sons Dredging Services and Assiniboine Injections Ltd. Dredging of the sanitary sewage lagoon is necessary every few years to ensure the wastewater treatment continues to operate at its optimum capacity. This is one of those assets that we keep talking about that require asset management.

The Council reviewed the unaudited 2015 financial reports for the water, sewer and waste utilities. You will find those unaudited reports in this edition of the Hermes.

The Zoning amendment in regards to "owner occupied dwelling" was read a second and third time and adopted.

A bylaw to enter into agreement with the City of Prince Albert to provide for emergency communications was adopted.

Utility users in arrears were ordered to have service disconnected for non-payment.

The assessment appeal fee for 2016 was set at \$300 per appeal and the District Board of Revision members, through WaterWolf, will be paid \$50 per appeal.

Emergency Measures Coordinator, Cindy Hoffman, was appointed to the Regional Emergency Mutual Aid Cooperative (REMAC).

A proposal was put forth and accepted for Rodney Lazenby to coordinate a committee to consider Christmas decorating in the Memorial Park provided the project is feasible with electrical services and council suggested that the committee request funding from charitable organizations in the community.

At our March Meeting:

A bylaw to amend the waste transfer station policies and procedures was adopted to update waste and recycle carts.

First reading was given to amendments to the Zoning Bylaw to update the zoning map and to an amendment to the Official Community Plan to update the Future Land Use Map.

Resolution number 285/15 was amended to read Operating Engineers which replaced the words Enbridge Training Facility. It was noted in the last Hermes that Enbridge had offered dirt to place behind the Elks Hall but it was actually Operating Engineers. Sorry for the mix-up!

Utility users in arrears were ordered to be disconnected for non-payment and a user that has had the service disconnected had arrears added to their tax roll

Pursuant to policy #1000, a tax exemption was approved to 101194970 Saskatchewan Ltd for improvement to property.

The temporary closure of a portion of Lincoln St. was approved for the purpose of a street hockey tournament hosted by the Artificial Ice Committee. Watch for posters! It sounds like fun! The 2015 Audited Financial Statements were presented and approved.

February and March meeting were record setting meetings with both of them being finished in and hour!

Drinking Water Quality and Compliance Annual Notice to Consumers

The Water Security Agency (WSA) requires that at least once each year waterworks owners provide notification to consumers of the quality of water produced and supplied as well as information on the performance of the waterworks in submitting samples as required by a Minister's Order or Permit to Operate a waterworks. Also available is a statement of revenues, expenditures & debt payments for 2015, and a comparison of revenues to expenditures and debt payments.

This information for the Town of Hanley is available for viewing during regular office hours at the Town Office in Hanley or on our website www.townofhanley.ca.

Notes from the Town continued...

Don't throw garbage down the drain

Help keep our sewage mains functioning. Don't use the sewer as a garbage can.

Things that go into the sewer through toilets, sinks or storm drains can end up in our creeks & lakes and clogging the sewage mains. You can help make a difference in the health of our waterways and sewage mains by following these proper disposal suggestions:

In your home or where you work

Put the following items in the garbage where they belong, instead of down the drain:

- cigarette butts
- dental floss
- condoms
- rags
- tampons and tampon applicators
- sanitary napkins
- disposable diapers
- human and pet hair
- cotton swabs
- cosmetics/makeup
- wipes (pre-moistened personal hygiene towelettes, often advertised and labelled as flushable or biodegradable)

food scraps (an even better solution is to compost them or dig them into your garden)

vegetable and animal grease, fats, oils (these substances can clog the sewer in your home and the Town system and cause sewer backup)

In your yard and on the street

Anything on the ground can wash into the storm drains on streets and lanes and end up in the creeks, so:

clean up your pet waste.

check your vehicle regularly to make sure hazardous waste fluids, such as oil, antifreeze and gasoline, aren't leaking.

don't litter.

don't put grass clippings, leaves and other yard waste on the streets or into rivers - they add harmful chemicals and nutrients to the rivers and clog sewage drains.

Hazardous waste products, chemicals and prescription drugs

These potentially dangerous substances don't belong in the garbage or dumped down the drain - they need special handling.

Dispose of hazardous waste products safely by taking them to a free household hazardous waste collection

These danger symbols can help you identify many hazardous waste products - e.g., corrosive, explosive, poison and flammable









 Many chemicals can damage the sewer in your home and the Town system. Plus, our wastewater treatment lagoon is not be able to remove them and they can end up seeping into the creek, harming fish and other aquatic life.

Take leftover or expired prescription drugs and over-the-counter medicines to a pharmacy where they will be disposed of safely.



You should be prepared to take care of yourself and your family for a minimum of 72 hours during an emergency. You should also understand the basic principles of first aid and safety.

Every disaster is a local disaster. Different levels of organizations respond progressively as an emergency escalates and their resources are needed. The first ones to respond are closest to



Do you have a person in your life who may be a hoarder? Hoarding is a condition where a person has persistent difficulty discarding personal possessions. The large amount of possessions fill the home and prevent the normal use of the space. Living space becomes cluttered. It may be unusable, Hoarding brings distress and emotional health concerns.

WHY HOARDING INCREASES FIRE RISKS

- Cooking is unsafe if flammable items are close to the stove or oven.
- Heating units may be too close to things that can burn. They might also be placed on unstable surfaces. If a heater tips over into a pile, it can cause a fire.
- Electrical wiring may be old or worn from the weight of piles. Pests could chew on wires. Damaged wires can start fires.
- Open flames from smoking materials or candles in a home with excess clutter are very dangerous.
- Blocked pathways and exits may hinder escape from

HOW HOARDING IMPACTS FIRST RESPONDERS

- Hoarding puts first responders in harm's way.
- Firefighters cannot move swiftly through a home filled with clutter.
- Responders can be trapped in a home when exits are blocked. They can be injured by objects falling from piles.
- The weight of the stored items, especially if water is added to put out a fire, can lead to building collapse.
- Fighting fires is very risky in a hoarding home. It is hard to enter the home to provide medical care. The clutter impedes the search and rescue of people and pets.

How Can You Help Reduce the Risk of Fire Injury

- When talking a person who hoards, focus on safety rather than the clutter. Be empathetic. Match the person's language. If they call it hoarding, then you can call it hoarding.
- Help the residents make a home safety and escape plan. Stress the importance of clear pathways and exits. Practice the plan often. Exit routes may change as new items are brought into the home.
- Install working smoke alarms in the home. Test them at least once a month.
- Reach out to community resources. Talk to members of the fire department to alert them of your concerns. They may be able to connect you with members of a hoarding task force for additional help.
