FIRE PROTECTION

Smoke Kills

SMOKE KILLS

Hundreds of people die in residential fires in Canada every year. In many fires that have been extinguished in their early stages, people have been found dead of smoke inhalation without having suffered burns. It has been conservatively estimated that many of these lives could have been saved by the installation of properly functioning smoke alarms. Although these devices are no substitute for carefully planned fire prevention measures, they are invaluable to providing an early warning when fire strikes.

Smoke is the cause of the majority of fire-related deaths. Hot flames are low on the list of killers during a fire. A smouldering fire may go undetected for hours, especially while people are asleep. In addition to deadly carbon monoxide, smoke carries poisons such as hydrogen cyanide and irritants such as formaldehyde and acetic acid. Added to this lethal potion are other toxic substances that come from the burning of synthetic materials commonly found in the home, especially those emitted from plastics and foams. Oxides of nitrogen, sulphur dioxide and ammonia are just a few examples. These agents can have a lethal effect before a sleeper is even disturbed; especially when one considers that the fire itself consumes life-sustaining oxygen.

Normally, air is made-up of about 21 percent oxygen. When it falls below the 17 percent level, thinking and coordination become difficult. Below 16 percent, a person's behaviour turns irrational, hindering escape efforts. Breathing becomes impossible when oxygen levels fall below 6 percent.

Super-heated air and gases rise quickly and produce what is known as a "hot" fire. Temperatures above 370°C (700°F) are common in a "hot" fire. At such high temperatures, unconsciousness and death can occur within minutes. Bedrooms located in the upper floors of residences are frequently subjected to these conditions in the advanced stages of a fire.

ANIMAL CONTROL

Below is part 10 of a series of notes from "An Enlightened approach to companion animal control for Canadian municipalities":

Dangerous Dogs

Addressing dangerous and potentially dangerous dogs is a challenge for municipalities. It is often difficult to determine whether a dog may be dangerous until it has bitten or attacked a person or animal. Municipalities should consider adopting legislation aimed at reducing the likelihood of harmful situations occurring. It is important for municipalities to keep in mind that dangerous dogs are generally the result of irresponsible ownership. Dogs can become a threat if they are not properly socialized and trained, if they are mistreated or if they are deliberately bred or encouraged to attack people or animals.

First, it must be established exactly what constitutes a dangerous dog. The criteria should not be breed specific as this only discriminates against certain breeds, instead of evaluating individual dogs by their behavior. Suggested criteria for identifying dangerous dogs include:

- a dog that has killed a person or domestic animal, regardless of the circumstances
- a dog that has bitten or injured a person or domestic animal. Exceptions may be made if the dog was teased, abused, assaulted or if the dog was reacting to a person trespassing on the property owned by the dog's owner
- a dog that has shown the disposition or tendency to be threatening or aggressive an attack trained dog

Municipalities should require that dangerous dogs either be euthanized in the interests of public safety, or that their owners meet specific requirements for the humane care of such dogs, that will ensure public safety. Penalties should be established for owners who do not comply with the requirements.

Dangerous dogs should be licensed and spayed or neutered as this may reduce aggressive tendencies and will prevent the owners from profiting from the sale of offspring that are also likely to be dangerous. These dogs should be muzzled and leashed when off the owner's property and strictly confined when on the owner's property. If an owner is unwilling or unable to meet these requirements, euthanasia should be imposed.

Some disasters such as snowstorms, intense cold snaps, earthquakes or environmental or industrial accidents may force you to stay home for a few days.

Always have provisions ready for a 72-hour period. Make sure they are replaced once a year:

- One litre of drinking water per adult for each day
- Canned food
- Crackers, cereal and pasta
- Peanut butter, tea, coffee, sugar, juice, instant soup and herbal tea
- Dried fruits and vegetables

If you come into the hall, you will see that a new door has been installed. Being new, it has been found to be a bit sticky at times but with use, we will see that improve. We have also had the Health Room improved by removing the old toilet stall and installing new locked cupboards, countertop and sink. These projects were provided as part of the Canada 150 Infrastructure Grant. There will be more projects completed as applied for within this grant. The Canada 150 Infrastructure Grant pays for 50% of improvements made to the facility.

The Centennial Committee held a regular meeting on Jan. 25. Darice reported that the pull station for the above grill fire suppression had been moved from behind the stove; and that Loraas has changed their billing where the Committee will be billed directly rather than going through the Town.

The committee reviewed all email messages since the AGM in April/15. The committee has found that minor decisions can be made quicker by electronic means. Over the last year the committee was concerned about the insurance valuation of the building. A SunCorp valuation was completed and the valuation of the building was increased to \$3.5M; and there were a few rental fee questions throughout the year where a general consensus was reached among the majority of committee members. There was a liability concern discussed whereas during rentals, children have been allowed to run freely throughout the facility and the stage, and climbing on the stacked chairs. The question arose where does the committee's liability fall? Should we be putting up posters, having rentals sign waivers, etc.? Richard will speak to SUMAssure at the SUMA convention for ideas.

A clean-up/painting/repair bee is planned for March 29 and the AGM is planned for April 12.

Notes from the Town

Administrator Darice Carlson was invited to be a member of a Provincial Landfill Advisory Team. The first meeting was held Dec. 15/15 in the Ministry of Environment offices in Saskatoon. When asked why the Town of Hanley was invited to this team, the discovery was revealed that out of 111 Transfer Stations in the Province, only 2 are in complete compliance; Hanley is one of them! Thanks to the diligence of our Transfer Station Operator, Public Works Foreman and the residents of the Town and RM of Rosedale we have reached a status that only one other municipality in the province has reached. Good job!

Introductions around the table included Councillors from urban and rural municipalities, representatives from SUMA & SARM and the Ministries of Environment and Government Relations.

Being an introductory meeting, there was a lot of discussion in regards to what to name the team, what mandate & objective do we have, how do we assist other municipalities/stakeholders, and future meetings. Concerns and problems from municipalities were discussed and how other jurisdictions handle waste; funding becomes a big concern and is regionalization an option; decommissioning is expensive and there are long-term liabilities involved.

Future meetings have been scheduled.

At our December Council Meeting:

Public Works Foreman, Ben Collins was approved to be registered for the Public Works Conference in Regina in Feb.

Servicing agreements were signed with Texcana Logistics and Providence Grain for infrastructure in the Industrial Park.

Amendments were made to *The Municipalities Act* through Bill 186, *The Municipal Conflict of Interest Amendment Act* that required councils to adopt a new Council Procedures Bylaw and policies for Public Disclosure statements and Employee Code of Conduct. The bylaw, policy and procedures were adopted at the December, 2015 meeting.

The old "Traffic Bylaw" had so many amendments to it that Council compiled all amendments into one bylaw and adopted it at this meeting.

The Policy Manual was amended that affected the type of hydrants to be installed where required for fire suppression services.

Employee wages were reviewed and adopted with a 1.5% increase for each employee.

Approval was provided for registration for the 2016 SUMA Convention for Mayor Marv Gerbrandt, Deputy Mayor Richard McGregor, Councillor Melissa Maddocks and Administrator Darice Carlson to attend.

Unpaid amounts of custom work were approved to be added to the tax roll if unpaid by Dec. 31/15.

Administrator holidays were approved for Dec. 24/15 and Feb. 21 to March 2/16.

A resolution was made to apply for a summer employment student with Canada Summer Jobs Initiative for 2016.

A waste rate increase from Loraas was reviewed to result in a bylaw to increase the rates for waste management within the Town. Loraas also decided that if the Town was in agreement, waste and recycle steel bins would be invoiced to individual users rather than the Town administering the invoicing. The council agreed to instruct Loraas to proceed with this.

Parking reminders were forwarded to people with vehicles parked on roadways.

Notes from the Town continued...

Approval was given to Ter-Ray Services for septic dumping in the Town of Hanley lagoon for the Enbridge Training facility.

The Enbridge Training facility needed space for moving clay that they were excavating so Council approved that they provide the clay to the area behind the Elks Hall. The Administrator was instructed to consult with SAL Engineering in regards to the drainage channel in that area to ensure it was not affected.

At our January meeting:

The first reading of a Zoning Amendment was completed to provide for owner occupied dwelling in the C2 Highway Commercial District.

A bylaw to provide for entering into an agreement with other municipalities for the provision of mutual aid was adopted.

The list of lands in arrears of 2015 taxes was presented to Council and the list was to be advertised in one issue of The Davidson Leader.

Appointments, Advisory positions and preferred vendors were approved.

Employee bonds were laid before Council.

Utility arrears were once again reviewed with service to be disconnected Jan. 18 if payment was not received by Jan. 15.

Deputy Mayor Richard McGregor was appointed SUMAssure voting delegate for the 2016 AGM conducted at the 2016 SUMA Convention.

The SUMAssure insurance policy was amended to include Class 2 insured persons. This coverage will assist volunteers that may get injured while volunteering on municipal property.
